

WHAT'S NEXT ...

The committee is considering the next major project following the completion of the interior of the Church.

Money has been donated and some set aside to clean, regulate and fine tune the organ following the completion of internal work. Forty years of accumulated dust and dirt makes tuning almost impossible. The pipes are not able to speak properly and have lost their brightness. \$12,500 is the likely cost.

The West wall of the Kennerley aisle is the next exterior project. The stonework, especially the chimney, is in urgent need of attention. The cost of this is likely to exceed \$30,000 without replacing the chimney at this time.



'Always The Next Thing' from Dan McNeill, Restoration Appeal Chairman

In November 2014 the repairs to the external sections of the roof of the main nave of the church were completed. At the same time the dormer windows were restored.

We have discovered that while no project runs exactly to plan, while unexpected issues always arise to test the budgeting strategy, the skills and goodwill from our tradespeople constantly bring the best result.

In our planning the question 'how far do we go?' forms part of the discussion. Our exploration into the dream to restore All Saints Church began with the commissioning of a Conservation Management Plan and it is to that document that we regularly refer.

New Patron for the All Saints Restoration Appeal

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CHURCH PORCH RESTORATION COMPLETED ...

Planning for the restoration of the porch of All Saints Church began soon after the completion of the external work to replace sections of the iron roof on the main church and the restoration of the dormer windows in late 2014 and began in late April 2015.



The projected was costed at some \$38,000. One member of the All Saints Church Restoration Appeal Committee, Mr Barry Hirt OAM, in consultation with the chairman, Mr Dan McNeill OAM and the Rector drew up a submission for funding through the *Tasmanian Community Fund*. The parish's submission was accepted and the project began.

Restoration of the stone was undertaken by our local stonemason Duncan Foster. Stonework involved some

intricate carving of feature stone. At the same time the pinnacle stone at the top of the porch was replaced as was the cross that had been absent for may years. This now leaves two more crosses to be replaced: one on the east end and one on the west end of the Kennerley aisle.



Stonework was a major feature of the work. However, other work included the replacement of the vinyl tiles which

contained asbestos with large granite tiles. Preparation of the floor for the tiles gave us the opportunity to level out some small lips in two places, extend the tiles from the glass entry doors into the church out to the footpath to provide welcome level access and an entry to the church much more pleasing to the eye and safe in all types of weather.



The ceiling and roof timber was cleaned and re-varnished. This, together with the re-painting and new light fittings has made the entrance to the church welcoming, bright and safe.

Another important part of the project was to lower the soil level and move the garden beds away from the stone to avoid the risk of dampness. Again Duncan's team came to the fore to undertake that work. A very happy consequence of

this necessary work has been the added beautification of the front section of the church. An outdoor art feature would enhance this furher.


After many years a new pinnacle stone and cross were

re-placed. The South Hobart Progress Association has been a generous supporter of our desire to replace the crosses. Two have now been replaced: a third is to go above the east windows and a fourth above the

windows at the west end of the Kennerley aisle.

SANCTUARY AND CHANCEL ...

At meetings in 2014 the Restoration Committee resolved to undertake interior work in the church. The installation of the excellent lighting system in memory of the late John and Doone Kennedy, together with 'collateral damage' to the walls as a result of the internal roof repairs has highlighted the urgency of this phase of restoration.

The committee has been able to have necessary work done to replace mortar in the arches over the organ and Sacristy. The chancel wall, chancel and sanctuary have been re-plastered and painted.

Thanks to generous donations from parishioners and members of the wider community plans are under way to complete the re-wiring of power points throughout the building, re-wiring and adding new lighting to the chapel, plastering and painting of the remainder of the church. The hope is that as many conduits as possible will be able to be 'chased in'. Thanks to a 'special purpose donation' the carpet in the chapel will also be able to be replaced.

CROWDS FLOCK TO ALL SAINTS ...

The fifth annual *All Saints Daffodil Show* drew some 1,400 people over the weekend of 12-20 September.

Families basked in the beautiful weather and listened to music provided by 'Ethereal', the Hobart String Band and Melbourne-based a-cappella group 'Market Lane'. There was also organ music in 'Music on the Hour' in the Church to accompany the display of vestments and church plate.

Children revelled in the Children's Tent with wind mill painting and colouring-in. The face painters were kept busy on both days. Fr David was even seen with 'Spider Man.'



Then there was the Petting Zoo from Zoo-Doo who dubbed this their 'favourite show' and, on the Sunday afternoon, the Blessing of the animals led around the property by a very obedient and tame lamb.

There was food, food and more food, a garden market ... and, of course daffodils in great numbers! What an exhibition! It gets better every year!!

Our band of happy of volunteers, replete with their aprons made by Susanne Nixon, always ensures that people are welcomed and made to feel at home.

The organising committee consisting of Owen Davies, Susan Williams and Yvonne O'Neill made sure that everything ran smoothly. The increased number of

exhibitors did us proud with the huge variety of daffodils, the quality of each specimen and the arrangement of them. So many people lingered to study the exhibits. The




miniature daffodils always catch they eye as do the novelty classes.
